NOTE 1 - ORGANIZATION AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Degrees of Change (the "Organization") is a Washington nonprofit corporation. The purpose of the Organization is to develop and provide leadership training, college scholarships and support for college access and success and career development services. The Organization's funding is received under grants with local agencies, from program service fees and donations.

Basis of Accounting and Basis of Presentation

The accompanying financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. Under this accounting method, revenues are recognized in the year earned, support is recognized in the year in which it is unconditionally promised, and expenses are recorded in the year incurred.

Degrees of Change is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to two classes of net assets based on the absence or existence and nature of donor-imposed restrictions as follows:

Net Assets without Donor Restrictions

Net assets that are not subject to donor-imposed stipulations.

Net Assets with Donor Restrictions

Net assets subject to donor-imposed stipulations that can be fulfilled by actions of Degrees of Change pursuant to those stipulations or that expire by the passage of time and net assets subject to donor-imposed stipulations that are to be maintained in perpetuity by Degrees of Change. The Organization does not have any net assets that a donor has stipulated to be maintained in perpetuity.

Cash

For purposes of the statements of cash flows, the Organization considers cash to be cash on hand and in checking and savings accounts.

Accounts and Grants Receivable and Contributions

Contributions received are recorded as support with or without donor restrictions depending on the existence or nature of any donor-imposed restrictions. Contributions, including unconditional promises to give, are recognized in the period received. Conditional promises to give are not recognized until they become unconditional, that is, when the conditions on which they depend are substantially met. Contributions of assets other than cash are recorded at their estimated fair value. Contributions to be received after one year are discounted at an appropriate discount rate using the U.S. Treasury rates corresponding to the period in which the contribution is to be received.

Accounts and Grants Receivable and Contributions (Continued)

Contributions that are restricted by the donor are reported as increases in net assets without donor restrictions if the restrictions expire in the fiscal year in which the contributions are recognized. All other donor-restricted contributions are reported as increases in net assets with donor restrictions, depending on the nature of the restriction. When a restriction expires, net assets with donor restrictions are reported as a transfer to net assets without donor restrictions (restrictions released) in the statement of activities. Contributions of cash or other assets that are restricted to acquire long-lived assets are reported as increases in net assets with donor restrictions until the assets are acquired and placed into service.

Grant revenue and the related receivable are recognized when they are unconditionally promised. Grants received with conditions are not recognized until they become unconditional, that is, when the conditions on which they depend are substantially met. Management considers accounts and grants receivable to be fully collectible; accordingly, no allowance for credit losses is recorded. If an amount becomes uncollectible, it will be charged to operations when that determination is made. All accounts and grants receivable are current at June 30, 2025.

Other earned income and the related receivables are exchange transactions and are recognized when control of the promised goods or services is transferred to the customer, which occurs upon satisfaction of the performance obligations identified in the contract. Contracted amounts are fixed and determinable, and performance obligations are typically fulfilled at a point in time. Management uses the current expected credit loss methodology to estimate an allowance for its exchange-based receivables, considering historical experience, current conditions, and reasonable and supportable forecasts. The Organization has elected the practical expedient to forgo the consideration of forecasts and has also adopted the accounting policy election to consider subsequent collections of receivables when evaluating credit losses. Accordingly, no allowance is recorded for amounts collected prior to the date the financial statements were available to be issued. For the years ended June 30, 2025 and 2024, management determined no credit losses were incurred and did not record an allowance for credit losses.

Furniture and Equipment

Furniture and equipment are recorded at cost when purchased or at fair value when donated; the recorded cost is capitalized with depreciation provided over the estimated useful lives (ranging from 3 to 7 years) of the respective assets using the straight-line method when the cost or fair value exceeds \$5,000.

Income Taxes

The Organization is exempt from federal income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Functional Allocation of Expenses

The costs of program and supporting services have been summarized on a functional basis in the statements of activities. The statements of functional expenses present the natural classification of expenses by function. Accordingly, certain costs have been allocated among the programs and supporting services benefited.

Reclassifications

Certain amounts have been reclassified in the June 30, 2024 financial statements to conform to the June 30, 2025 presentation.

Adoption of New Accounting Standard

In July 2025, the Organization early adopted Accounting Standards Update ("ASU") No. 2025-05, Financial Instruments - Credit Losses (Topic 326): Measurement of Credit Losses for Accounts Receivable and Contract Assets ("ASU 2025-05"), prior to the issuance of its financial statements for the year ended June 30, 2025, as permitted under the transition guidance. ASU 2025-05 introduces a practical expedient and an accounting policy election that simplifies the estimation of current expected credit losses ("CECL") for receivables arising from exchange transactions. Specifically, the Organization elected to consider subsequent collections of receivables when evaluating credit losses, and no allowance was recorded for amounts collected prior to the date the financial statements were available to be issued. The impact of the adoption was not considered material to the financial statements, and it is expected to reduce the complexity of the CECL methodology.

Subsequent Events

Management of the Organization evaluated subsequent events and transactions for potential recognition and disclosure through October 15, 2025, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

NOTE 2 - CONCENTRATION OF CREDIT RISK

Accounts at the Organization's financial institutions are insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation ("FDIC") with basic coverage up to \$250,000 per institution. At June 30, 2025, the Organization's cash balances did not exceed the insured amounts.

NOTE 5 - OTHER ASSETS

During the year ended June 30, 2012, the Organization purchased the rights for the Act Six program that it developed over several years from another nonprofit organization, Northwest Leadership Foundation. The costs associated with the program were capitalized and are being amortized using the straight-line method over 15 years.

Amortization expense associated with the Act Six program was \$3,933 for the years ended June 30, 2025 and 2024.

Net assets with donor restrictions include grant funds totaling \$104,847 and \$526,245 at June 30, 2025 and 2024, respectively, that are restricted for the development of the Foyost software. The Foyost software was developed internally by the Organization between 2015 and 2021 as a data tool for institutions of higher learning. In 2023, the Organization sold the Foyost software to another entity, while the Organization retained licensing rights to continue using, selling and enhancing Foyost software within the state of Washington. Following the sale, the Organization continues to pursue opportunities to utilize restricted funds in accordance with donor stipulations.

NOTE 7 - LEASES

Operating right-of-use ("ROU") assets represent the Organization's right to use an underlying asset for the lease term and operating lease liabilities represent the Organization's obligation to make lease payments arising from the lease. Operating lease ROU assets and liabilities are recognized at the commencement date based on the present value of lease payments over the lease term. As most of the leases do not provide an implicit rate, the Organization uses its incremental borrowing rate based on the information available at commencement date in determining the present value of lease payments. The operating lease ROU asset also includes any lease payments made and excludes lease incentives. The lease terms may include options to extend or terminate the lease when it is reasonably certain that the option will be exercised. Lease expense for lease payments is recognized on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

The Organization's lease agreements do not contain any material residual value guarantees or material restrictive covenants.

The Organization leases an office facility under a long-term, non-cancelable operating lease agreement. The lease expires in 2026. The lease provides for increases in future minimum annual rental payments as defined in the agreement. The lease agreements generally require the Organization to pay applicable taxes, insurance and repairs.

The Organization leases a copier under a long-term, non-cancelable operating lease agreement. The lease expires in 2027.

The weighted-average discount rate is based on the discount rate implicit in the lease. If the implicit rate is not readily determinable from the lease, the Organization estimates an applicable incremental borrowing rate. The incremental borrowing rate is estimated using the Organization's applicable borrowing rates and the contractual lease term.

NOTE 8 - RETIREMENT PLAN

The Organization has a 401(k) retirement plan that allows employees who have met certain eligibility requirements to contribute part of their pay to the plan. The Organization matches employees' contributions based on a percentage of salary contributed by participants. The Organization's contribution expense for the years ended June 30, 2025 and 2024 was \$40,468 and \$53,471, respectively.

NOTE 9 - FUNCTIONALIZED EXPENSES

The financial statements report certain categories of expenses that are attributed to more than one program or supporting function. Therefore, expenses require allocation on a reasonable basis that is consistently applied. The expenses that are allocated include facility expenses, which are allocated on a square footage basis, as well as salaries and benefits, program activities and materials, operations, equipment and technology, meetings and training, depreciation and other, which are allocated on the basis of management's estimates of time and effort.
